ESCALLOPED EGG PLANT

One medium sized egg plant, 4 teaspoons salt, 1 cup water, 3 tablespoons butter, 3 tablespoons flour, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon paprika, 1/4 teaspoon celery salt, 1 1/2 cups milk, 1-3 cup cheese, cut fine.

Peel the egg plant, and cut in one-half slices crossways. Sprinkle the salt on the slices and add the water. Place a weight on top and let stand for half an hour. Carefully rinse the egg plant with cold water and cut in one-inch cubes. Melt the butter, add the flour, and when well blended, add the milk and cook until creamy. Add the seasonings and the egg plant. Pour into a well-buttered baking dish. Sprinkle the cheese on the top and bake in a moderate oven for 25 minutes.

AMERICAN COFFEE CAKE

4 1/2 cups flour, 4 level teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon mace, 6 level tablespoons butter or lard 2 eggs; 1 2-3 cups milk and water (half and half), 1 cup sugar (scant).

Sift flour, then measure; add baking powder, salt and sugar; sift 3 times; chop butter in with spoon, beat egg whites with half egg-shell of water added to each until stiff, then add yolks, and beat in; add milk and beat all together; turn into two square pans and spread even; brush top with milk. Spread with the following first with egg:

1-2 cup Graham cracker crumbs 1-2 cup sugar, 1 level teaspoon mace, 3 level tablespoons butter.

Mix crumbs, sugar and mace; rub butter in until it is crumbly; spread on top of cake.
